It's been 19 years since we were last together. The 19-year part was long overdue... We have seen each other over video chat, but it isn't the same.


I was very blessed to have the opportunity to go.

Words are never enough to say how appreciative we are to have Clare there for Annie.


If you know Annie or as the world calls her "Annie O," you can understand that she is a unique individual with a specific point of view. And Clare gets her.

And Clare, to her you are her Clare Bear, and that is her way of saying "I Love You!"




