What unifies all the DSPs we spoke to is not just the care they have for the people they support, but also the significant personal growth they've experienced during their time here.


We are continually thankful for every DSP, and we hope you enjoy the stories we've compiled in this book.



Suzette, who also works at a nursing home, was inspired to apply to become a DSP because of her passion for helping people.


"I wanted to work with people who have developmental disabilities," Suzette said. "So, it just kind of went hand in hand for me."

When asked what people should know about being a DSP, Neverhalie said the hard work is rewarding.

"You'll get something out of it," she said. "One way or another, you'll receive benefits from it."



Kia Wright

Kia Wright supports the young women living at Saxon Avenue in Bay Shore.

Kia was inspired to become a DSP because she comes from a family of caregivers. Growing up, her grandmother hosted people with intellectual and developmental disabilities in her home.

"As a young girl, I would see what it took to take care of people who weren't always able to take care of themselves," Kia said. "It's just in my blood. It's in my purpose to give back and be a supportive person overall."

Kia has been a DSP for Citizens for a year and four months, bringing a background of care from other local agencies. With an already busy schedule of supporting the young women she supports live full and enriching lives, Kia, a former division one collegiate basketball player, is a basketball coach, inspiring people through her business Wright Way Performance and her nonprofit Kwiet Storm Youth Development.

"Everyone needs support," Kia said. "Everyone needs that help, and I just wanted to be that to the world."

Some may wonder how Kia can balance being a DSP and a basketball coach. Kia said it's simply proper sleep and time management. "When you enjoy what you're doing, it's not like it's work for you," Kia said. "It's a passion, it's a calling, and it's a gift."

Whether on the basketball court or in the Bay Shore residence providing leadership and support, Kia is a champion!



Lavern Bedward supports the people living at Port Washington Boulevard in Manhasset.

Lavern was inspired to apply for the role of DSP because of her cousin back home in Jamaica, who is on the autism spectrum. When she heard that she could apply the same care and compassion that she has for her cousin professionally, she was filled with joy.

"I'm so protective of my cousin," Lavern said, adding that she is reminded of her love for him when working with the people who live at the Manhasset residence.

Lavern has been a DSP with Citizens Options Unlimited for over two years.

"I've learned what their likes and their dislikes are, and how to respond to them if they're asking a question, and if they're upset, how to treat the situation and how to calm them," Lavern said when asked what she's learned over her two years here. "I've learned how to be patient and know that they can't express themselves like how we express ourselves. Patience is the key, overall, to be with the people living at the Manhasset residence, and how to treat them and how to understand."

Being a DSP, Lavern said, requires love, care, passion and respect. "Even though they're not your family, you have to treat them like how you would want someone to take care of you," Lavern said. "Being a DSP is a good job, and I love it."

Lavern, the love and compassion you have for your family and the people living at the Manhasset residence does not go unnoticed.

"They're able to resolve issues they have with each other," Alana said. "I really admire that about them. They're adventurous. Most of them are down to try different things. We went to the Ducks game. We went to Round1, the arcade. I like how adventurous they are."

When asked what people should know about DSPs, Alana said that anybody can make a difference and help their community, no matter what their experience or formal education is.

Thank you, Gerard! We are so glad that you were inspired to work with us, and now you're inspiring others!




Andrea Sparks
